Research Objectives

The goal of this project is to better understand the current state of water-related special districts in California's northern San Joaquin Valley.

To analyze power dynamics in water governance, this research considers: levels of contestation in elections; vacancies; race, ethnicity, and gender dynamics of board members.


Keywords & Concepts

Water Governance:

Administrative system that influences drinking and non-drinking water use and management. Often governed by five directors on a board.

Special Districts:

Local government agencies formed and governed by local residents that provide essential services to millions of Californian residents. Their services include, but are not limited to: water, cemeteries, fire protection, mosquito abatement, and healthcare.





Community Organizing & Advocacy Work

After generating data, the project team will develop fact sheets to disseminate information with key communities. Because Latinx and low-income communities are disproportionately impacted by California's drinking water crisis,* public presentations and *platicas* will help recruit water board candidates from these communities to prioritize community drinking water needs.

Securing long-term, safe, & affordable water

Overall, this project seeks to shift representation in water-related special district boards to adequately represent rural communities of color.
